undreds of SEIU Local 888 members and guests came together for last month's membership convention—the largest gathering since Local 888 was formed in 2003. Members attended from across the state, representing chapters large and small. "The convention was a testament to the members of Local 888," says President Mark DelloRusso. "The commitment to building our union was truly an inspiration for us all."

Key note speaker Tom Woodruff, SEIU Executive

and resources to be stronger. Dues Equality is the critical step we have to take to reach that goal," said Rodrigues.

Members took to the floor to speak and ask questions about the proposed dues measure for more than an hour. Mashpee Department of Public Works employee Jim Corcoran spoke to the issue of fairness. "Unions are about treating everyone fairly. Treat everyone fairly and we can be a stronger union."

Vice President, spoke about the attacks on public sector employees, and urged delegates to get involved in order to fight for a better future. "The one percent has one clear goal: keeping working people from standing up and fighting back collectively," Woodruff warned the crowd. "We need to change the debate. We have to get more of our members involved than ever before."

In a presentation to delegates on the proposed Dues Equality measure, which places all members on the same 1.6 percent dues structure, Secretary-Treasurer Brenda Rodrigues explained that adequate resources are key to building a stronger, more effective union. In recent months, Rodrigues, DelloRusso and other Local 888 leaders visited dozens of chapters across the state and heard a common refrain. "We heard that chapters need more help Others talked about their hopes for a better union and said that they are encouraged by Local 888's new direction. "A lot of things are changing for the better," said Lori Moran of the Watertown Town Hall Associates. "I like the idea that as a small chapter we can be stronger."

The resolution for Dues Equality passed by more than a 3 to 1 margin in a secret ballot vote. The new dues structure will be phased in beginning in January 2013.

In addition to the Dues Equality measure, members also passed a resolution urging resistance to

employer efforts to shift insurance costs to workers and strongly supporting reforms that build on the national Medicare program as a model to contain health care costs and the best way to achieve a single high standard of health care for everyone in America. *Continued on back page*

Staff Profile: Regional Representative Lisa Field

Lisa Field, who became the regional representative for Local 888 back in August, knows a thing or two about a rebuilding a union. Field was working in the library at Fitchburg State University when the school announced the coming layoffs of twenty employees. Concerned that FSU management was ignoring the contract and were likely to pick and choose who they wanted to lay off, Field decided to step up and get involved. She became the steward, a position she held for four years, before running for president of her AFSCME local that represents 3,000 state and community college employees across Massachusetts. "Our goal was to get as many people involved as we could and really revitalize the local," says Field.

Field would go on to work for AFSCME Council 93 as a staff representative for three years, working with 2,800 members in public education and in 22 cities and towns. These days Field spends most of her time assisting Local 888 members, primarily in Worcester County. Field says that she's particularly excited by the opportunity to help rebuild and reinvigorate a union. "The way SEIU is organized, the members have a lot of say. The leadership is held accountable by the members—that's significant," says Field.

While Field's days as a campus library worker may be in the past, she continues to advocate for public higher education and sits on the board of PHENOM, the Public Higher Education Network of Massachusetts. Says Field: "As a child of an a immigrant, affordable public higher education has enabled me to live the American dream. I want those same opportunities not only for my kids but for all kids in Massachusetts."

Brockton Unions Join Forces on Health Care

A coalition of public service unions in Brockton, including SEIU Local 888, has reached an agreement that will ultimately save the city an estimated \$28 million in employee and retiree health insurance costs. The agreement preserves the right of service workers in Brockton to negotiate over their benefits while generating significant savings that will be split between the city and its health plan subscribers.

Until recently, every public employee union in Brockton negotiated over health insurance benefits individually, either with the City or the School Committee. Last summer, local unions, including Local 888, which represents city department

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heads, library personnel, school cafeteria workers and administrative personnel, began working together in an effort to find a solution to soaring city health insurance costs.

"By coalition bargaining with employees from different unions and retirees as equal partners, Brockton has demonstrated historic leadership for the people who provide services in that city and showing that unions will work to protect the health care of their members," said Brenda Rodrigues, Secretary-Treasurer of Local 888. "By agreeing to uphold the right of unions to bargain over health insurance, the city council put their differences aside and the unions proved that a lot can be accomplished when people sit down and work through problems like this together."

atino members of Local 888 have wanted to start their own caucus for years. Now, thanks to the hard work of Jorge Vargas, Margarita Franco, Enio Lopes, Rosa Matias, Norma Martinez and others, the vision is becoming a reality. Christina Villafranca, a Local 888 organizer, and a force behind the new caucus, explains that the goal is to reach Latino and Haitian members of the union and encourage them to get involved. "We want to bring everyone together as one community and start to educate each other about what it means to be part of a union," says Villafranca.

Villafranca notes that the group's model for a forceful Latino Caucus comes from Local 721 in California, which has a caucus hundreds strong. The Local 888 group, which has been meeting regularly, also hopes to join forces with the SEIU International Latino Caucus. In the meantime, caucus members are reaching out to Latino and Haitian workers. "We want workers to come to us with workplace issues and work together to find a solution." Caucus members are also creating a fund that will help members who need emergency assistance, including help with rent or food.

Local 888's Rosenblum Wins "Green" Prize

When Beth Rosenblum got the call that she'd been selected to receive this year's Sudbury Valley Trustees' Distinguished Public Service Award, she could hardly believe it. "My first thought was 'why am I being recognized?' I've always worked as part of a team."

Rosenblum, who works as the conservation administrator for the town of Southborough, was recognized for the 12 years she has served on the Ashland Open Space committee. Rosenblum also helps to coordinate Green Up Ashland, the town's annual Earth Day celebration that features a town-wide clean up. The Distinguished Public Service award honors an individual who has demonstrated exceptional leadership in local, state or national government service.

In addition to her environmental activism, Rosenblum is also an active union member. A third resolution—passed unanimously—supported uniting more workers in Local 888 to win good jobs and a stronger voice to improve public services by identifying new opportunities resulting from the restructuring of government and public services to unite more workers in the private sector.

A resolution on a Financial Transaction Tax (FTT) failed to win support from the Local 888 executive board, but nevertheless was adopted by the membership after an impassioned presentation by Greg King on the floor of the convention. The FTT would place a half a percent federal tax on financial transactions, yielding as much as \$350 billion a year in new revenues for much needed services and other social benefits. *Copies of the four resolutions adopted at the convention are posted on the Local 888 website at www.seiu888.org/convention/*

Special guest, Boston City Councillor Charles Yancey, summed up the spirit of the convention when he praised members for fighting for all working people. "[I]f we fail to protect the rights of all workers, then we fail to protect our future and we fail to live up to the beliefs on which we have been raised."
